
Visit by Principals and Vice-Principals from South Zone

On 25 April 2013, 17 School Leaders from South Zone attended a learning journey to Fairfield Methodist School (Primary) to learn more about how the school's Teaching and Learning Framework is incorporated in lessons. They visited the classrooms of five teachers, namely Mr Joel Lim, Mrs Yaw Siok Ching, Mrs Tay Shu Yi, Mdm Png Bee Hiong, and Mrs Mimi Cheong, to view the translation of the '5E + 1' Model in classroom settings. The classroom observation lessons were followed by a discussion with Heads of Department. This visit was organised by the South Zone Community of Practice for Leadership in Curriculum and Instruction.

Learning Symposium for Parents

English Language Learning Symposium

The English Language Department held a Learning Symposium for parents on 7 March 2013. Entitled ACE Writing Workshop, the symposium aimed to equip parents with an understanding of the P5- P6 writing structure. In all, about 60 parents attended the talk, which was held in the evening for the first time. Parents learnt more about the marking rubrics for continuous writing, the six traits of writing (ideas, organization, word choice, sentence fluency, voice and conventions) as well as some strategies which teachers adopt in a typical writing class at Fairfield. Parents got to do their bit of writing as well as they tried out one of the strategies, the "Flashback" technique. With knowledge gained from the Workshop, it is hoped that parents would be able to better support their children at home to ace the writing component.



When children encounter difficulties in their work, parents are often the first source of help for their children. Many parents end up having to 'learn' and 'unlearn' mathematics concepts and procedures with their children as they become increasingly involved in their children's education. At the Mathematics Symposium held on 13 Apr 2013, parents learnt how to differentiate between a conceptual or procedural mistake. They also learnt how to ask the right questions to help their children develop strong Mathematical conceptual understanding.

Chinese Language Symposium

The Mother Tongue Department conducted two Learning Workshops for parents in Semester 1. The first workshop, "Creative Writing", was targeted for P5 and P6 parents. The speaker, Mr Wang Deqing, shared important tips on how to help pupils excel in composition examinations. The second workshop, "Reading with Your Child", was conducted by our own CL teacher, Mdm Gu Xiaomei. She shared with parents the importance of cultivating good reading habits from young. She also shared useful tips on how parents can encourage their children to love reading.

Science Learning Symposium

On 27 April 2013, a 3-hour workshop was organised by the Science Department for Primary 5 and 6 parents. The focus of the workshop was to expose and explain to parents how they could help their children tackle the area of applying and articulating scientific concepts effectively.

 Mrs Olive Kan she was my form teacher in Sec 1 when I was in the Normal stream. Even when I had moved on to the Express stream in Sec 2, she continued to look out for me and also helped me with my literature studies.
- 5. When did you first become interested in presenting/television work?

 I really sort of "fell" into it by chance. I had been working behind the scenes as a Producer, Director, Scriptwriter...making TV shows, corporate videos...the company I had been work ing for at the time was looking for a host for a new show. I decided to try out just for fun and I got the part. After that, I started presenting more TV shows while still working behind the scenes. I found it came quite naturally and that is when I started to pursue it a bit more...but it was never a goal to begin with.
- How did you end up in Channel News Asia?

 I was fortunate because they came looking for me. I had been in the media industry for some time already and had worked on a CNA show before.  Though I have been at this role in front of the camera for about 7-8 years now, there is still much to learn. Every day is different in this job and that is what keeps it interesting. I have done some part time teaching over the years and in the future I would like to teach again. I feel it's important to share my experiences and I've always enjoyed working with young people as well. But for now, I'm happy where I am because this job allows me to do what is most important to me right now...and that is to spend time with my children.

 Enjoy the time in school, make good friends and don't be afraid to try new things. Experience is one of the best ways to learn anything. And ask questions, you can't learn if you don't ask
