





However, intensive studying without resting will cause you to be too tired such that it will affect your psychological well-being. Do remember to take regular breaks by playing some games, talking to your loved ones or exercising to alleviate your stress. Though you will face challenges during this stressful year, you should never lose hope and have faith and confidence in your abilities. 

3. Best memories of Fairfield?

Competing at the annual cross country race at MacRitchie Reservoir; checking girls out during recess time (just joking!) and trading basketball cards and comics.

Rock festival, Mediacorp Star Awards, TVB Awards, A-Nation etc.

7. What made you or why did you recently sponsor equipment for the Fairfield Homecoming alumni event?

Fairfield always holds a special place in my heart. I attended Fairfield Primary and Secondary and both schools played a key role in helping to shape me into who I am today. My wife, Ming, was also from Fairfield too. In fact, we are still very close to many friends we made from our school days. It is just this bond we all have since school days.
