

## A COMMITTED ALUMNI

You read about our first male President Mr. Adrian Tan (Class of 1996) in a previous issue of In Tandem, but what about the rest of the Alumni Association Committee? We caught up with some of them and asked them why they are volunteering time for the Alumni Association.

The Alumni Association is led by a group of volunteers who serve in the Committee. Every year, the Committee takes the lead in key activities by the Association, including organising the annual Founder's Day Dinner and Alumni Teachers Lunch. They maintain the website (www.fairfieldalumni. org.sg), reply emails and post regularly on the Alumni Facebook page to interact and communicate with members. Of course, they also publish In Tandem and coordinate the submission of articles from both schools. Over the years, the Alumni Association has put together and added events like Past vs Present Games to the recent Homecomings. They take part in school events like carnivals and fundraising. Often, they see themselves as not only linking alumni to schools, but also a link between both Primary and Secondary schools.

Many joined the Committee because they were invited by someone else to serve. For Vice-President Kelvin Ong (Class of 1989, 4E), he remembers being voted into the committee when he took part in the biggest Annual General Meeting ever of the Alumni Association back in year 2000 at Carlton Hotel - more than 100 alumni were in attendance that year. He shared, "There were only 2 or 3 other old boys in the Committee then: Ong Sin Tiong and Charles Chan (both Class of 1986), and David Tay (Class of 1989). Together with Kristine Goh, Joni Ong, Veronica Chia, Jenny Soh, Mrs Tang Poh Kim, Ms Dorothy Ho, Gloria Chee, Tan Siew Chwee and a few others, we formed the new committee in the new millennium and thus began my 17-year involvement with the alumni committee to date. I joined the Alumni Association graduation at the Founder's Day Dinner in 1990 at Mandarin Hotel (when I was in JC1). It was with a sense of pride and belonging to the Fairfield family that I wanted to be a part of the alumni association."

The Committee has representations from both schools who are nominated by the school Principals. Chua Wei Wei (Class of 1990) represents the Primary School and Joseph Guo (Class of 1997), the Secondary School. Whilst the school need not nominate Alumni to be representatives, there was no lack of Alumni to choose from as many of our Alumni are serving as teachers in

both schools. They represent the school at Alumni Committee meetings and play a key role in supporting Alumni related events.

For Lo Wei Pin (Class of 1980), joining as a life member after graduation was her way of continuing to be part of the school that she loves. In 2006, she signed up to be part of the Committee when all her three children started school in Fairfield. She explained, "I wanted to be involved in my children's school lives and activities. I saw it as an opportunity to serve and I was definitely attracted by the strong Fairfield spirit and camaraderie that the committee had." Wei Pin has a huge role in the Committee – as the treasurer, she balances the accounts and oversees the Association's cashflows,

ensuring that all income and expenses are properly accounted for. She also sends the annual accounts for auditing and oversees their approval at the Annual General Meeting before filing them with the Registry of Society.

Pei Lin is also in charge of issuing letters of

One registration. "We know how important
Primary One registration is for some of our
Alumni Association members and try our
best to allay their concerns by updating
them about the registration process like
reminding them to request the letters from
us two months prior to registration date."

His strong interest in Fairfield's history prompted Zhan Yanxin (Class of 1997) to join the Committee. Yanxin was hoping that he could learn more about the rich history and heritage of the school by being part of the Committee. After joining the Committee, he not only learned more about the history of the school, but enjoys meeting up with old classmates and teachers during Alumni events.

Whilst parents send their children to Fairfield to study, the best memories of Fairfield tend to be unrelated to academics. Kelvin remembers leading worship at Chapel and leading the Chess Team to National Schools Tournament as President of the Chess Club. Wei Wei remembers fondly the canteen stall aunty in Primary school that sells luncheon meat and potato rice, and her Principal Miss Cheong Yuen Lin who took time to teach them their 'Ps and Qs'.

For Felicia Foo (Class of 1976), chapel services were definitely her best memories. She also fondly remembers her math teacher Mrs Chiu Peck Siong. Similarly, Raymond remembers his Chinese teacher Miss Law, his Secondary One Physical Education, teacher Miss Jessie Sing, Literature teacher Miss Emmanuelle and

his Geography teacher Mr Charles Chan. Although feared in school, Discipline Masters like Mr Hou Meng Hsien and Mr Siew Lin Tuck are also fondly remembered by many Committee members!

Why continue to serve in the Alumni Association? Felicia shared, "In the many events that we organise, we share a sense of achievement when, as a committee, we know that we have created another platform for Fairsians to come together and through them, create yet another shared memory with each other."

In fact, many Committee members shared about being witness to God's goodness and faithfulness whilst serving in the Alumni Association. Wei Pin recounted, "At the last 2 carnivals, I was involved in the Alumni food stalls. God not only provided food items abundantly but food items were also fully sold out. Another incident was the 125th Founder's Day Service - a combined service with both schools. It was raining at the start of the event which was held in the open school field. The service started at the scheduled time despite the rain and we were all holding umbrellas. As we sang the opening hymn 'Great is thy faithfulness', the rain gradually stopped and by the end of the hymn, the rain stopped completely!"



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## CURIOSITY & TENACITY BEHIND 'INVISIBLE CLOAK'

Eugene Lek, Winner of the Broadcom MASTERS International Award (Junior Scientist Category) at the Singapore Science and Engineering Fair 2017



How did you feel when you were awarded the top prize of the Broadcom MASTERS International Award at the Singapore Science and Engineering Fair 2017?

I felt overjoyed as I did not expect to win the top prize since there were many other projects that were theoretically more advanced than my project.

#### What did you do for your science research project?

I was wondering how secure the security systems really were. How likely was it for anyone to go undetected in a highly-secured facility? This intrigued me enough to decide to test them out for myself. As such, I set up and calibrated common security sensors as well as designed and built a suit that would enable one to go undetected among those sensors.

## What was a particularly memorable experience during the conduct of your science research project?

Mr Ngoei was a very demanding mentor who expected me to do my best, so it felt really satisfying when I finally managed to complete my project by successfully putting on my suit and walking around undetected by the common security sensors.

#### What sparked your interest in Science?

I started developing a passion in Science since primary school without knowing why. But one thing I know for sure is that the constant discovery of new things that happen around us still continues to intrigue me.

Honestly, I hope to become an engineer rather than a scientist in future. I wish to use the new ideas that scientists discover to create and develop solutions for the people around us.

## How was your experience at the Broadcom MASTERS International programme and the Intel Science and Engineering Fair at Los Angeles? What did you learn from it?

The experience was great. I got to meet people who were of the same age as me from all over the world who were equally passionate about Science. I not only learnt about the projects that others had done, but found out about the limited resources they had while carrying out their science research projects. For example, most of the other students I met had no teacher mentors to guide them in the planning and execution of their projects. They had to rely on themselves to find the necessary resources to do so. I am just thankful that in our schools in Singapore, we have dedicated teachers who help us to learn about new things and grow in personhood.





## Are there any key people from Fairfield Methodist School (Secondary) whom you owe your success to?



## How has your active involvement in the Girls' Brigade in Fairfield influenced and nurtured you to become the person you



How did you feel when you collected your it is crumpled and torn, it can never go back to its original form. Mr Lee Yew Ming proved to me that punishment isn't always the solution to tackle malicious behaviour, and that at times, you have to understand an individual's background, reason for causing mischief as well as the negative peer influences, and give him or her the necessary advice so that they may avoid making the same mistakes. These teachers helped me to demonstrate clarity in making sound decisions in the course of my studies in Fairfield.



I also owe my success to my parents, who encouraged me to take up the option of being laterally promoted to the Normal (Academic) stream in Secondary Two. Having attained a PSLE score of 148 points, I was originally from the Normal (Technical) stream in Secondary One. But my parents believed that I was able to soar higher and do better, and pushed me to my limits to meet the criteria for a lateral transfer to the Normal (Academic) stream. With persistence and tenacity, I did well enough to qualify for the lateral transfer.

I am also thankful to my form teachers then, Ms Helen Chong and Mr Gary Chew, who encouraged me to go ahead with the lateral transfer. A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step, and this opportunity was that first step I took.

To me. CCA was a stress-reliever. The camaraderie I forged amongst my cadets and schoolmates always gave me a reason to look forward to my CCA every Wednesday and Friday. It is important to plan ahead and prioritise what needs to be done first. This really helped me to cope well with both my studies and CCA.

#### Do you have any advice for the 2018 batch of Secondary 4/5 students?

You should never ever disregard the amount of effort our Fairfield teachers are willing to put in to help you succeed at the national examinations. Everyone is born with the ability to do something special, and should see themselves as being capable of doing well in their studies. Even if you fail, you must understand that every successful individual has encountered failures before reaching the top. Colonel Sanders, the founder of the recipe for KFC chicken, had his recipe turned down 1009 times before it was accepted. As an inventor, Thomas Edison made 1,000 unsuccessful attempts at inventing the light bulb before finally succeeding. Persistence and determination are key to achieving success, and I believe all of you will develop the willpower to do well in your national examinations.

Miss Lau Woon Yoke, Class of 1960, taught English and Mathematics to generations of Fairsians from 1963 to 2005.
