BAKING HER WAY TO SUD COCESSS

Carina Tan describes herself as a pastry enthusiast, a food lover and a mess creator. But she is definitely more than that – she is an international award winning pastry chef at Swissotel The Stamford & Fairmont Singapore. How did she embark on this journey?

Carina Tan graduated in 2010 from Fairfield Secondary and went on to study electrical engineering in Singapore Polytechnic. Armed with a diploma already, she then decided to pursue her interest in pastry and baking – and as she puts it herself, she has 'not looked back since'. She formally studied pastry and bakery before joining a kitchen baking buckets of cookies, macarons and making chocolate decorations. Today, she is the Chef De Partie of Swissotel The Stamford & Fairmont Singapore.

"I enjoy working very much and I developed an even greater passion for chocolate making and pastries. Inspired by my peers and driven by my new-found love for chocolate works, I made my way into several competitions. Through these competitions, I expanded my knowledge and continued to hone my skills," Carina shared.

Well in 2018, she took part in the internationally recognised patisserie competition - Mondial Des Art Scurës - which is held in Paris every two years, consisting of the top 16 countries around the world, like France, Japan, USA, Malaysia and Singapore. For the competition, they had to produce one chocolate sculpture and one sugar sculpture, each with a minimum height of 1.2m, and one mixed sugar and chocolate sculpture with a minimum height of 40cm. On top of that, they had to bake 30 chocolate and fruit confectionary, 20 ice cream petit cakes, 20 plated desserts and 4 chocolate entremets. These were all done over a span of 19 hours spread across 2 days. Indeed it was no easy task!

"In an international competition, we always try to bring our own personal touch to try and come up with something that is unique or not done before but of course most importantly try and show the best of what Team Singapore could bring to the world. It was a big but pleasant surprise that we were





placed 3rd out of 16 teams. It was a big reward personally for all the hard work the team has put in together and the support we received from everyone."


It certainly seemed like a very tough competition and a challenging career! When asked if she will encourage others to join her profession, Carina had these tips, "It is not the easiest job to pursue, and the hard truth that not many will tell you that it is not the highest paying job one can get. However, if you are good at baking, it is one that will bring you great personal satisfaction from the joy that you bring to others."

When asked what she remember of her time studying in Fairfield, Carina shared that it is filled with memories of the time spent with her friends and how they were all part of the school as one big family. "I think one of the biggest takeaways from my school days was the character development the school provided me, teaching me to put in the best that I can in everything that I do, even if one may not see the outcome initially."

As a Secondary 4 student in FMS(S) in 2018, Lee Wen Long was an exemplary leader who was competent in organising his team and proposing different ways to serve the elderly in the Dover community. He initiated solutions to problems and offered suggestions to resolve issues. When conflict arose during the Secondary 3 FLEX Week, Wen Long stepped forward to mediate the situation and encouraged his peers to contribute. He also displayed great compassion and patience with peers who were not easy to get along with, and was often willing to partner them in various projects. These acts demonstrated his commitment to serving the community.

Furthermore, Wen Long demonstrated resilience in both his academic and CCA pursuits. Despite holding leadership roles in both Media@Fairfield and as a Community Student Leader which entailed heavy responsibilities, he remained resolute in giving his best in his studies.

What were some projects that you initiated outside of school to help the less privileged?

My first project took place during the December holidays in 2016. My group of friends and I accompanied children from Kidzcare@Kembangan Chai Chee Centre during a one-day excursion to the Universal Studios Singapore. This was then followed by a Christmas Party, which was planned by us. It was carried out at one of the pavilion blocks near the Kidzcare@ Kembangan Chai Chee Centre. The project aimed to provide a listening ear to the less privileged children so that they would feel included in the community.

In 2017, I founded an initiative titled 'Smile for Miles' with my peers. This Values-In-Action committee which I founded and worked in was established to reach out to the underappreciated, the underprivileged and the unhappy people in our society.

What motivated you to go the extra mile to organise such projects to help the less privileged, despite your busy schedule and heavy workload?

2015 was an important milestone in my journey, as this was the year I entered FMS(S). It dawned on me that I needed to demonstrate even greater commitment to my community because I believe that no one should be left behind. As Robert Ingersoll once remarked, "We rise by lifting others." It is ultimately our willingness to help one another that allows us to progress and become stronger together as a community.

What was one memorable experience you had while helping others?

Beautifully wrapped donated storybooks were presented to the children during the event. I really enjoyed my encounters with the children as they were very enthusiastic about the activities. The twinkle in their eyes during the games and storytelling segments told me that more than anything, their thirst for fun learning experiences gave them the courage to smile despite the hurdles they face every day.



What advice will you give to Fairsians to motivate them to participate more actively in Values-In-Action (VIA) projects?

Fairsians, do consider organising a VIA project with your friends for the organisation that you are interested in. This need not be a large scale project. It can include many small different acts as simple as giving a card of thanksgiving to the cleaners, greeting 'Good morning, have a safe day ahead!' to bus drivers, and perhaps distributing drinks to construction workers who exhaust themselves under the hot sun.

You can also consider reaching out to the larger community through the multitude of organisations in Singapore. You can partner Willing Hearts, childcare centres, community clubs or even the Dover Residents' Committee.

You can also join the Community Student Leaders to engage in more of such projects. Moreover, you can put your e-mail writing skills in language classes, the calculations in mathematics classes, and the discussions in Lifeskills classes to good use and practice, as you communicate with the organisation, manage your budget and understand your community!







After all, all of us should lend a helping hand to the people around us so that our commitment to the immediate community can make us stronger together. This will then make the world a more peaceful and warmer place to live in.



Major Chia Chi Yu is an Alumni of Fairfield who is now a regular with the Republic of Singapore Air Force (RSAF) as a F-15SG weapon system officer. In Tandem sent him eight questions so that we can better understand what our air men do protecting our skies!

Question 1 : Your full name, year of graduation and class.

I am Chia Chi Yu, an alumnus of Fairfield Methodist primary and secondary schools. I was previously from Sec 4E, Class of 2001.

Question 2 : What were your CCAs in school?

I was in the school band in both primary and secondary schools. I was also a school prefect from Primary 5 through Secondary 4.

Question 3 : Best memories of Fairfield?

Band practice! Making great music with even better friends are some of my best memories in Fairfield. Be it preparing for the Singapore Youth Festival (SYF) Band Competitions or performing in New Zealand, the hours spent together never seemed enough – so much so that I even joined the Fairfield Alumni Winds after graduating. Also, I thoroughly enjoyed serving Fairfield as a prefect. The leadership opportunities given to me definitely helped me to make my decision to join the Republic of Singapore Air Force as an officer.

Question 4 : Most memorable teacher?

Ms Tamara Nair was my Geography and English teacher in secondary school. She was passionate about the subjects she taught and that passion definitely rubbed off on most of her students. She inspired me to be outspoken, enthusiastic and to think outside the box. She made class time fun and at the same time, gave us the space to learn and be creative. I try to apply the same when I train my junior aircrew today.

Question 5 : What did you do after you graduated from Fairfield? (in terms of further education etc)

After graduating from Fairfield, I went to Jurong Junior College. I enlisted for National Service in December 2003 and joined the RSAF in 2006. I have been with the RSAF since then.

Question 6 : Tell us more about your work now. What does it involve?

I am a Weapons Systems Officer (Fighter) (WSO for short, pronounced 'Wizzo') by vocation. I fly with the pilot on the F-15SG and operate numerous advanced avionics, integrated sensor suites and weapons systems. The two-person team allows us to target multiple targets at the same time. The pilot focuses on the air-to-air fights, while the WSO focuses on ground targets. I am also a graduate of the inaugural F-15SG Fighter Weapons Instructor Course, held in Mountain Home Air Force Base in the USA. As a Fighter Weapons Instructor, I am in charge of training both the pilots and WSOs on the F-15SG platform, ranging from junior aircrew learning to fly and operate the aircraft, to senior aircrew learning to be instructors on the jet. Operationally, I stand ready to defend Singapore's sovereignty and our Singaporean way of life.

Question 7 : Why should our students consider joining our RSAF?

The RSAF provides me with an unconventional, fulfilling and meaningful career path. My day at work takes me over 30,000ft into the air, past the speed of sound - sometimes inverted. My work also requires me to train overseas, where I learn and interact with our counterparts, and immerse myself in diverse cultures around the world! This is definitely an opportunity that few people have the privilege of experiencing.

Question 8 : Any words of wisdom for your junior Fairsians?

It's not too early to start dreaming and planning for the future. Fairfield has provided me with the great environment to do that! As the saying goes – Any setbacks that you face are merely opportunities to something greater. Keep your chin up and continue to soar Above All!
