

What were your CCA in school?

I was in Netball and I played Goal Shooter mainly and was also a PA Crew.

**What were your best memories of
Fairfield? Who were some of your most
memorable teacher(s)?**

My best memory of Fairfield was the service learning trip to Thailand, Kanchanaburi. It was the first overseas trip in my life and it was a meaningful one. We were there to help a school in a village build a library mainly. We were split into a few groups to do different tasks such as teaching the students English, painting the library and building a small pond.

Most memorable teachers were Mr Heng Choon Poh, Mr Ezal Sani & Mr Alvin Ng. Mr Heng was my E-Math teacher when I was in Secondary 4. He was very patient in teaching us and he was willing to go the extra mile for me after he left Fairfield by tutoring me outside of teaching hours and helped me through my O-Levels examination. It was with his help that I managed to pass my Mathematics.

Mr Ezal was one of the coolest form teachers in Secondary 5. He plays the guitar so well! He was also a very patient teacher despite it being our O-levels year. He did not stress us, but kept encouraging us throughout while we were studying for our O-levels.

Mr Alvin Ng was my English teacher in Secondary 5. He was a fun teacher to have! He was strict with us but yet when it was time to loosen up and have fun, he would join us! There was once I remembered prior to English lessons when our class tend to play a game of volleyball during our free period, he came and joined us before the lesson started!

**What do you work as now? Please give
designation, company name, and describe
what you do. If possible, share with us
when you first joined this profession.**

I am a Senior Staff Nurse with the Cardiothoracic Intensive Care Unit (CTICU), at the National University Hospital. I have been working in the CTICU for 7 years since 2013. In CTICU, we work with the intensivists (doctors who manage critically ill patients with complex medical needs) and a dedicated team to provide optimal immediate care for our critically ill, post cardiac surgical patients. We manage patients who require Extracorporeal Membrane Oxygenation (ECMO) support, a type of high-level device used to support the heart and lungs.

**How are you involved in the frontline
work during this COVID-19 period? Please
describe what you do during this period as
a frontline worker.**

I am part of a wider group of nurses deployed to augment manpower resources at the National Centre for Infectious Disease (NCID). My role involves caring for COVID-19 patients, including those who require this advanced ECMO support. These patients usually have a severe and life-threatening illness that prevents their heart or lungs from working properly on its own. As an ECMO specialist nurse, I manage the needs of these critically ill patients - this includes multi-organ support, complex haematological, fluid and sedation management, ensuring quality care for my patients through an open multi-disciplinary team approach.

Prior to my deployment to NCID, I underwent a two-week induction and three days of on-the-job training on actual clinical ground. We were taught how to use their systems as well as NCID's protocols and workflow. We were also given case scenarios to simulate infection control practices on clinical ground. A few examples would be transporting of COVID-19 positive patients to scan rooms, how to draw blood and dispatch them.

**Please share how you feel about being in the
frontline working during this period of time.**

Initially I was worried as I have a big family with two elderly parents. There was fear of potentially spreading the infection to my family. However, there are tight infection control workflows at my workplace to ensure the safety of both patients and staff. These infection control policies definitely helped to address those fears, and helped my family feel at ease. I feel honoured to be able to play my part in the fight against COVID-19, by providing timely and optimal care for my patients.

Fairians?**

I've had many fond memories at FMSS. The following is one of the most vivid memories, which happened in 1997. I was playing basketball with my buddies one early morning in school when we received news of the SilkAir MI185 crash. In it, were three of our beloved Fairfield teachers - Ms Yee Pui Leng, Ms Koh Poh Kwee and Mrs Tan Chay Hoon. This came as a shock to all of us and it left us speechless and lost. In one week, we had lost four of our teachers, including Mrs Soon Ching Lin who had passed on earlier in the week due to heart failure. The three teachers on that fateful flight had been on a trip to attend to Mrs Soon's funeral.

The news was a huge blow to each and every Fairfian, especially those who had been taught by the teachers. Mrs Tan was my Art Teacher then.

Though this unfortunate series of events was really painful for Fairfians, we did not let it get us down. I remember how the school rallied together to support one another through the difficult period. The losses spurred us to work even harder and excelled in our O Levels, so as not to let the teachers down.

Both teachers had an impact to me during my school days at different stages and never gave up on me, giving me the support both mentally and academically.



**What do you work as now? Please give

when you first joined this 'profession'.**

As Head of Air Carrier Services, Airport Terminal Security Unit, Certis, I oversee the security operations we provide to airlines at Singapore Changi Airport. With over 200 officers under my care, our operations include providing security for access control for aircrafts and restricted areas. We also perform security checks in aircrafts before departure to make sure that travellers can have a safe flight and peace of mind.

**How are you involved in the frontline work
during the COVID-19 crisis? Please describe
what you do during this period
as a frontline worker.**

COVID-19 hit Singapore suddenly and quickly. Certis plays an important role in this fight against COVID-19 alongside Singaporeans. From hospitals and shopping centres, to airports and public transportation, Certis helps to ensure that we continue to support the nation to combat and keep the pandemic under control. For COVID-19 operations, I am leading the security operations as the Overall Ground Commander for one of the Community Care Facilities (CCF). Together with my team of Auxiliary Police Officers and Security Officers, we make sure that the CCF is safe and secure round the clock so that the medical staff can focus on looking after persons who are sent to the CCF.

the frontline working during this time.**

I am honoured to have this opportunity to contribute to the fight against COVID-19 as a frontliner. No doubt this is going to be a long drawn fight, but I have faith in my team and in Singapore. With our resilience and fighting spirit, I know that we will pull through eventually. We will continue to push on alongside the medical teams at the CCF as one. I am also thankful to have the love and understanding I have gotten from my family and my wife-to-be. With their support, it keeps me going, knowing that what I am doing is meaningful and for a bigger cause.

**Lastly, any words of advice for our
younger Fairfians?**

Never ever rush to grow up. Everything in our life journey happens for a reason. Take your time to learn from every obstacle you come across, and there will be many throughout your life journey. A shut door you face doesn't mean it is the end of the world, but it just means you have to look for another that will open for you. Never be afraid to ask. There is nothing wrong with not knowing but what's more important is the thirst for knowledge and having the willingness to learn.

You might have heard of this song titled 'Singapore, Unite as One'. This was written by Jacob Neo, our junior from Fairfield Methodist School (Primary), to encourage everyone to stay strong and united during this difficult and uncertain trial! As a school community, Fairfield Secondary has certainly come together as one to keep all staff and students safe.

Well, what has Fairfield Secondary done to 'fight the COVID-19 virus and win'? Since Term 1, our school has set up new protocols and implemented new measures to protect everyone in the Fairfield family. Amongst these new practices are the 'Wipe-Down' routine and the Home Based Learning programme.

The 'Wipe-Down' routine is a practice in which students exercise personal responsibility to themselves as well as to others. Handmade soap solutions and paper towels are provided in the classroom and the canteen area. This is to encourage students to wipe their study desks, usually at least once in the morning, and the tables in the canteen that they use after meals. This helps to kill the virus and bacteria on the tables which will not only protect the user of the table at that time but prevent future users of the table from falling ill.

"Personally, I find that the 'Wipe-Down' routine helped to strengthen my sense of

personal hygiene," commented Michelle Sy from Secondary 3B. Jessica Bethapudi, a Secondary 2 student shared a similar sentiment, saying that the routine has "helped me to stay safe and healthy during this period of time, and to be more mindful of my surroundings."

Indeed, just as we have been blessed by others who wiped the canteen tables that we now use, we relay this blessing by cleaning up after ourselves. This is how we as Fairsians live out this year's school theme, 'Blessed to Be a Blessing', in our daily school life! Furthermore, we must thank the non-teaching staff members who supply and resupply us with paper towels and handmade soap solution every day.

Another measure we have taken to 'fight this virus and win' is the Full Home Based Learning programme that is currently conducted on a daily basis. Though some students initially found it difficult to adapt to Home Based Learning, many eventually adapted to the novel learning mode. Some students even found it enjoyable.

Bella Su, a Secondary 2 student shared, "We can not only learn at our own pace, but spend time bonding with our family members at home. Home Based Learning essentially allows us to kill two birds with one stone." Ms Joanna Lim, an inspiring Literature and Geography teacher added,

"Home Based Learning creates a conducive environment whereby students not only learn to be independent, but to better plan and manage their time. In addition, the quieter students may feel more comfortable speaking up or asking questions since they are not being looked at by their peers." Evidently, Fairsians are learning well under such unique conditions, and are aware of the importance of staying at home to stop the spread of the virus.

While we're at home, we can still play our part as a member of the Fairfield community. Joanna Tan, a Secondary 2 student, shared, "If I have doubts regarding my studies, I can ask my friends, and they are sure to help me willingly. Our caring teachers have also been conducting online consultations. In spite of this extraordinary circumstance, all the teachers still make sure that we continue to learn and be meaningfully occupied."

Fairsians, this is a great opportunity to be a blessing to our community. As our country battles against COVID-19, let us play our part to encourage and support one another. The fight against COVID-19 is never alone! Together, we will overcome it!

Katelyn Lim: Blessed to Be A Blessing to the Community

“Give your best in everything you do,” Katelyn Lim advised. “But never become proud when success comes your way.”



Katelyn entered Fairfield Methodist School (Secondary) as a Secondary 1 Normal (Academic) student. Since then, she has made significant academic progress. Yet, Katelyn remains humble, claiming that her success was due to her teachers and peers from Secondary 1G of 2014 who have journeyed with her through the years.

“They fostered a spirit of resilience and perseverance in me, spurred me to go beyond my limits and maximised my potential. If it weren’t for their constant support, I wouldn’t be who I am today.” With the support of her family, teachers and friends, she aced her GCE O-Level examinations, attaining an L1R5 score of six points.

Katelyn then went on to Anglo-Chinese School (Independent) (ACS(I)) to embark on the International Baccalaureate (IB) programme. When she was in ACS(I), she reached out to the community through the school’s Interact Club where she helped to plan meaningful activities for the elderly and disabled, and execute engaging reading programmes for children. She hopes to become a General Practitioner on mission trips to bless the broader community.

Katelyn is now an IB graduate. She had done exceptionally well in the IB examinations, scoring 44 points out of a possible 45! As part of the Education and Career Guidance Programme for the graduating classes, Katelyn came back to Fairfield Secondary to give a talk to students who are interested

in the IB course. She explained that the IB programme places great emphasis on the development of research skills and it incorporates community service into the formal curriculum. Through her time at ACS(I), she had to initiate projects related to the concepts of Creativity, Activity, Service (CAS), which are akin to the Values-In-Action (VIA) programme in Fairfield Secondary.

She assured the Secondary Four and Five students who may be worrying if they are able to meet the expectations of the IB curriculum: “I was once in your shoes where I had minimal experience in conducting research for various topics, but I managed to pick up the necessary research skills during my two years in ACS(I) with the help of my friends and teachers.”

Furthermore, she commented that Fairfield Methodist School (Secondary) provided the environment for her to grow into a person who can be a blessing to others. “Often, we view our failures and hardships as obstacles to success. However, during my time in Fairfield, I learnt to be persistent in the face of setbacks and to see my failures as opportunities for growth. I was also happy that I was given the platform to empower others who may face similar circumstances that I had experienced before.”

“Moreover, the Fairfield Learning Experience Week opened my eyes to various societal issues. This provided the perfect platform for me to move beyond an awareness and understanding of such issues in

society, to bringing about engagement, action and meaningful change to the best of my abilities. Overall, I am grateful for the journey that I have gone through in Fairfield Secondary as it has ignited in me a passion for learning and giving back to the community.” Katelyn indeed embodies Fairfield’s theme of ‘Blessed to be a Blessing’.

“Always remember that being selfless will bring you places. Continue to trust God even if you do not see the fruits of your labour. Do not despise small beginnings and embrace the process you’re in,” Katelyn advised

Stemming the Spread of the Virus

“Don’t forget to take your textbooks home! You’ll never know when Full Home Based Learning will take place!”



How often did you hear this from your teachers during the COVID-19 period? With the rapidly evolving COVID-19 situation, our students were reminded time and time again to be prepared. Across the island, new protective measures have been implemented. As a result, businesses are embracing telecommuting and restaurants are being told to suspend their businesses. Evidently, COVID-19 has quite significantly impacted life in Singapore.

However, that’s not a problem for Fairfield Methodist School (Secondary)!

In the past few months, our school has adopted several precautionary measures, with the most significant being social distancing practices. Now, what does this entail, exactly?

“We’ve been paying particular attention to social distancing because it is essential in ensuring our safety,” shared Nicole Tan, a student from Secondary 2D.

If you visit Fairfield, you’d find teachers at the school gates conducting visual screening of all staff and students who enter the school. You’d find students avoiding the foyer, leaving the once crowded place completely desolate. You’d find tables set a metre apart in classrooms, ensuring physical distance between every student. Even our morning assembly sessions are conducted in classrooms, as stricter social distancing measures mean students get to watch daily morning devotions and weekly chapel sessions through YouTube live-streaming or other tele-conferencing modes.

It was heartening to see all Fairsians complying with the implemented precautionary measures and helping those around them. Sarah Chan, a Secondary 1A student said, “I had to add more activities to my daily routine, like taking my temperature, as well as doing the wipe down drill first thing in the morning and after eating at the canteen. These were not practised before the pandemic. However, I think it helped me to take responsibility for my actions. Also, I learnt the importance of maintaining our personal hygiene at all times.”

The long-awaited bell rings. The staggered lunch break means students of different levels make their way to the canteen at different timings so as to reduce inter-level mingling. They can no longer sit freely as they used to, as each class now has designated tables in an effort to reduce inter-class interaction. Trisha Ng of Secondary 2G1 commented, “The school made sure we socially distanced ourselves, reminded us to wash our hands every day, and taught us to be more hygienic to prevent the spread of the virus.”

As part of social distancing efforts, CCAs were also suspended, and students were prompted to leave the school compound as soon as the school day ended. Yet, in light of this circumstance, our students continue to remain optimistic.

“I’ve been able to step outside of my CCA and look at the situation in a more introspective way. This suspension helped me to realise that we previously really put in much time and energy into our CCAs,”

Deborah Jane Carter, a Secondary 3F student, revealed. “I think that once the situation improves and CCAs are allowed to resume, I’ll be better able to stay safe while enjoying the benefits of participating in my CCA. In fact, I feel protected in school because I think that our school is a safe space from the virus.”

This pandemic, albeit devastating, can still bring out the best in people. Through mutual encouragement, Fairsians have been supporting one another through the crisis, and some have also made it a point to bless the community. Spearheaded by our Community Student Leaders, specially designed and handwritten cards from our students and teachers were personally given to our nurses and doctors at NUH. This was Fairfield’s way of blessing and thanking the very group of frontline medical staff who have been combatting the COVID-19 virus from Day 1!

At the end of the day, Fairfield has indeed grown stronger together, with everyone exercising self-discipline in the form of social distancing, providing encouragement and help for one another, and blessing the community around us. But it doesn’t have to stop here. As our Principal Ms Chen emphasised, “It is even more critical for us to support one another in our learning and well-being during this Circuit Breaker period. Let us continue to look out for and bless one other in the Fairfield family during this crisis and beyond!”
